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CAP Assessment of Suwannee Correctional Institution

I. Overview

On February 7-9, 2017, the Correctional Medical Authority (CMA) conducted an on-site physical and mental health survey of Suwannee Correctional Institution (SUWCI). The survey report was distributed on March 8, 2017. In April 2017, SUWCI submitted and the CMA approved, the institutional corrective action plan (CAP) which outlined the efforts to be undertaken to address the findings of the February 2017 survey. These efforts included in-service training, physical plant improvements, and the monitoring of applicable medical records for a period of no less than 90 days.

On October 9, 2017, CMA staff requested access to monitoring documents to assist in determining if an on-site or off-site assessment should be conducted. Based on the documents provided, CMA staff conducted an on-site CAP assessment on October 27, 2017 to evaluate the effectiveness of corrective actions taken by institutional staff. The CAP closure files revealed sufficient evidence to determine that 10 of 20 physical health findings and 23 of 39 mental health findings were corrected on the Main Unit. Additionally, 11 of 17 physical health findings and 8 of 9 mental health findings were corrected on the Annex Unit.

On March 23, 2018, CMA staff requested access to monitoring documents to assist in determining if an on-site or off-site assessment should be conducted. Based on the documents provided, CMA staff conducted an on-site CAP assessment on April 25, 2018 to evaluate the effectiveness of corrective actions taken by institutional staff. The CAP closure files revealed sufficient evidence to determine that 5 of 10 physical health findings and 5 of 16 mental health findings were corrected on the Main Unit. Additionally, 3 of 6 physical health findings and 0 of 1 mental health findings were corrected on the Annex Unit.

On October 16, 2018, CMA staff requested access to monitoring documents to assist in determining if an on-site or off-site assessment should be conducted. Based on the documents provided, CMA staff conducted an on-site CAP assessment on November 2, 2018 to evaluate the effectiveness of corrective actions taken by institutional staff. The CAP closure files revealed sufficient evidence to determine that 4 of 5 physical health findings and 5 of 11 mental health findings were corrected on the Main Unit. Additionally, 2 of 3 physical health findings and 1 of 1 mental health findings were corrected on the Annex Unit.

On May 10, 2019, CMA staff requested access to monitoring documents to assist in determining if an on-site or off-site assessment should be conducted. Based on the documents provided, CMA staff conducted an on-site CAP assessment on May 24, 2019 to evaluate the effectiveness of corrective actions taken by institutional staff. The CAP closure files revealed sufficient evidence to determine that the remaining physical health finding were corrected on the Main Unit. Additionally, the remaining physical health finding was corrected. Mental health findings on the Annex Unit were closed at the last CAP assessment.

On November 19, 2019, CMA staff requested access to monitoring documents to assist in determining if an on-site or off-site assessment should be conducted. Based on the

documents provided, CMA staff conducted an on-site CAP assessment on January 9, 2020 to evaluate the effectiveness of corrective actions taken by institutional staff. Items II and III below describe the outcome of the CMA's evaluation of the institution's efforts to address the survey findings.

III. Mental Health Assessment Summary

A. Main Unit

The CAP closure files revealed sufficient evidence to determine that 2 of 4 mental health findings were corrected. Two mental health findings will remain open.

Follow-up assessment by the CMA will most likely take place through an on-site evaluation.
